

The First World Cerebral Palsy Day Awards Announced

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More than 60 countries are celebrating World Cerebral Palsy Day on Friday 6 October and this year sees the first World Cerebral Palsy Day Awards presented to projects from nine countries.

World Cerebral Palsy Day celebrates the lives and achievements of people with cerebral palsy (CP) and their families, but also the focus of a growing social movement to ensure that everyone with cerebral palsy has the same rights, access and opportunities as others in their communities

In 2017 the first World Cerebral Palsy Day Awards are presented to projects or campaigns that have achieved real progress to improve the lives of people with cerebral palsy and their families – at a community, national or international level.

Robyn Cummins, World Cerebral Palsy Day Manager, explains: "We have found that there are 6 key issues that affect people with cerebral palsy, irrespective of geography, culture, language and economic differences."

"The Awards are designed to showcase the initiatives that are making an enduring difference in one or more of these areas."

"The international judging panel were impressed and overwhelmed with the number and quality of entries. All the winners demonstrated clear goals, measurable outcomes and lasting benefits. They all also have potential to be adopted in other countries or regions, which is very exciting."
