Issues that confront children and young people

- High teenage pregnancy rate
- Increasing rate of new HIV infection
- High over-all prevalence of violence against children (NBS-VAC 2016)

Enactment of laws (HIV and RPRH) which served as policy barriers for minors to access life-saving services



Proxy Consent

refers to the process by which people with the legal right to consent to medical treatment for themselves or for a minor or a ward delegate that right to another person.

Meaningful engagement of children and young people



In keeping with the principle of meaningful and ethical child and youth participation, they have been consulted in the development of the protocol on proxy consent. PROTOCOL ON THE PROVISION OF PROXY CONSENT FOR HIV TESTING SERVICES OF CHILDREN VULNERABLE TO AND AT RISK OF HIV

1. RATIONALE

From the year 2011 to 2015, the Philippines has recorded an unprecedented 230% increase in the number of new HIV infections from among 15-19 years odd or the young key affected population (YKAP). The HIV infection within this age group is mostly sexually transmitted among males who are having sex with males (58%), males who have sex with both males and females (26%), and males who are having sex with females (9%). Aside from sexual transmission, 7% of the new infections come from sharing infected needles.³

Furthermore, based on the 2016 disaggregated HIV care cascade (diagnosis, linkage to care, treatment, and viral load testing) data, it is notable that the young M/TSM are in disadvantaeeous nonition in accessing and retaining in care and treatment. Only,
